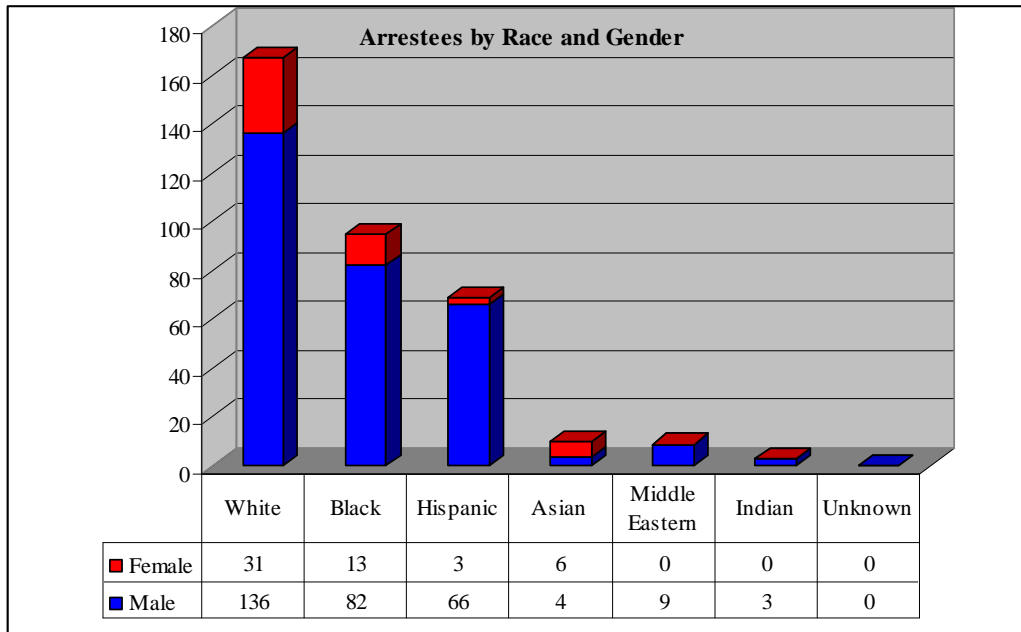


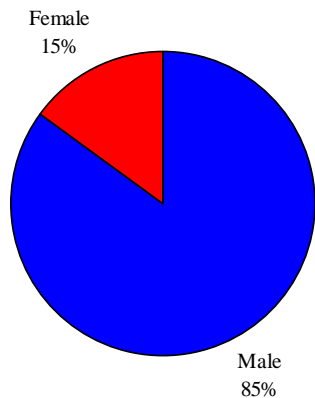
**RACIAL/GENDER BREAKDOWN OF POLICE/COMMUNITY INTERACTIONS
1ST HALF OF 2007**

ARRESTS:

As the following charts illustrate, the total number of arrests for the first half of 2007 was 353. 47% of the people arrested were white, 27% were black, 20% were Hispanic, 3% were Asian, 3% were Middle Eastern, and less than 1% were Indian. 85% of the arrestees were male and 15% were female.

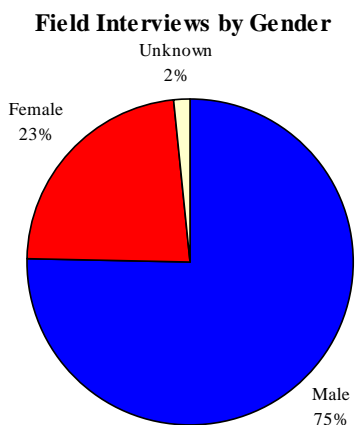
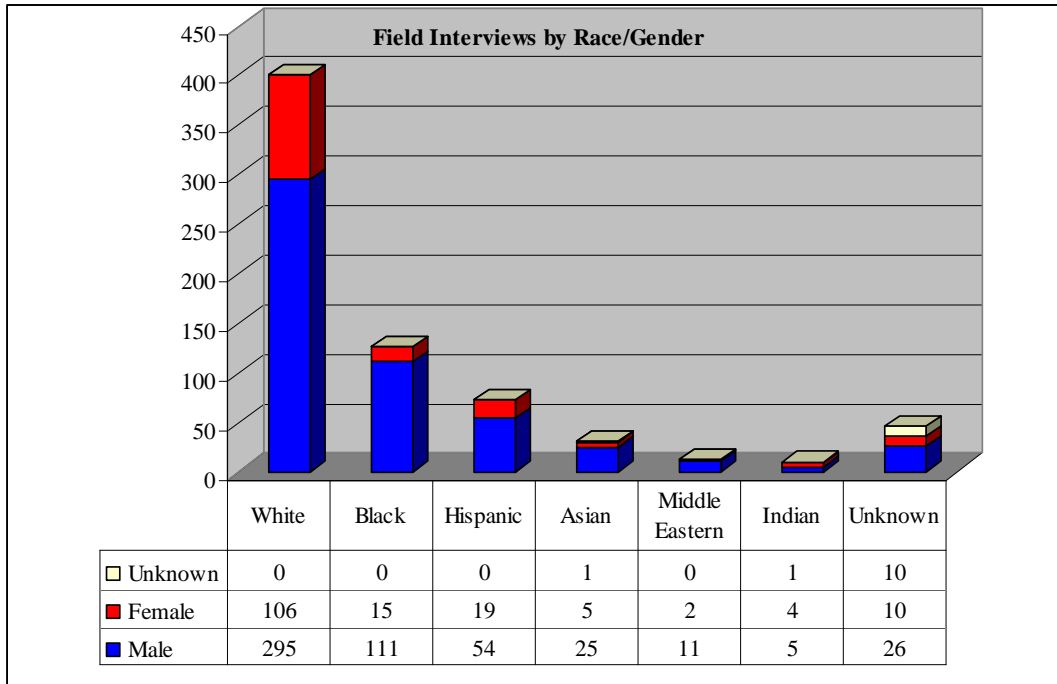
During the first half of 2007, the Brookline Police also took 40 people into protective custody (for being under the influence of alcohol). 75% of these PCs were white, 7.5% were black, 10% were Hispanic, 2.5% were Asian, 2.5% were Middle Eastern and 2.5% were Indian.

The race and gender ratios for arrests during the first half of 2007 are down 24% from the 463 arrests during the same period last year. For the first half of 2006, 52% of the people arrested were white, 25% were black, 17% were Hispanic and 4% were Asian. None were Middle Eastern or Indian. 83% of the arrestees were male and 17% were female.

FIELD INTERVIEWS:

In the first half of 2007, there were a total of 700 field interviews conducted, up 31% from the 535 field interviews during the first half of 2006. Of these people who were stopped and questioned for suspicious or nuisance activity, town-by-law violations and/or interviewed as part of an investigation, 57% were white, 18% were black, 10% were Hispanic, 4% were Asian, 2% were Middle Eastern and less than 1% were Indian. 7% were not identified by race. 75% of the people FI'd were male and 23% were female and 2% were not identified by gender.



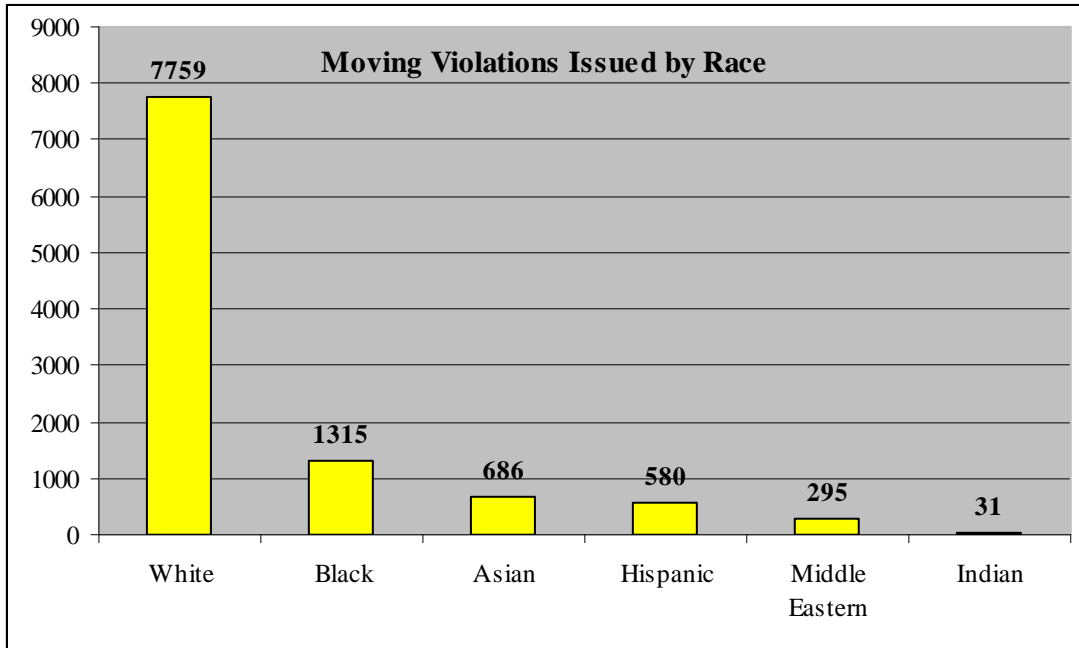

The race and gender breakdown of field interviews conducted between January 1 – June 30, 2007 remains fairly consistent with prior years. In the first half of 2006, there were a total of 535 field interviews conducted. Of these people, 51% were white, 20% were black, 13% were Hispanic, 3% were Asian, 2% were Middle Eastern and less than 1% were Indian. 6% were not identified by race. 74% of the people FI'd were male and 18% were female and 6% were not identified by gender.

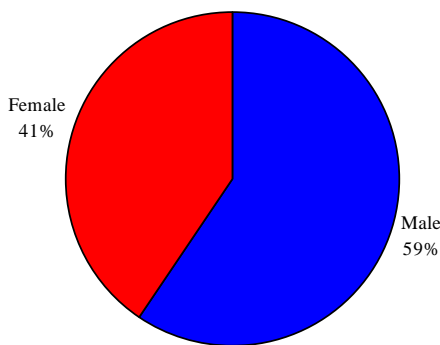

MOVING VIOLATIONS:

The following totals represent the number of persons stopped and issued a written moving citation during the first half of 2007. During the first half of 2007, there were 10,666 moving violations issued, up 16% from the 9,214 that were issued during the first half of 2006. Of the motorists issued citations, 73% were white, 12% were black, 6% were Asian, 5% were Hispanic, 3% were Middle Eastern and less than 1% were Indian. Of these citations, 59% were issued to male motorists and 41% were issued to female motorists. These figures nearly mirror the totals for the first half of 2006.



Moving Violations by Gender



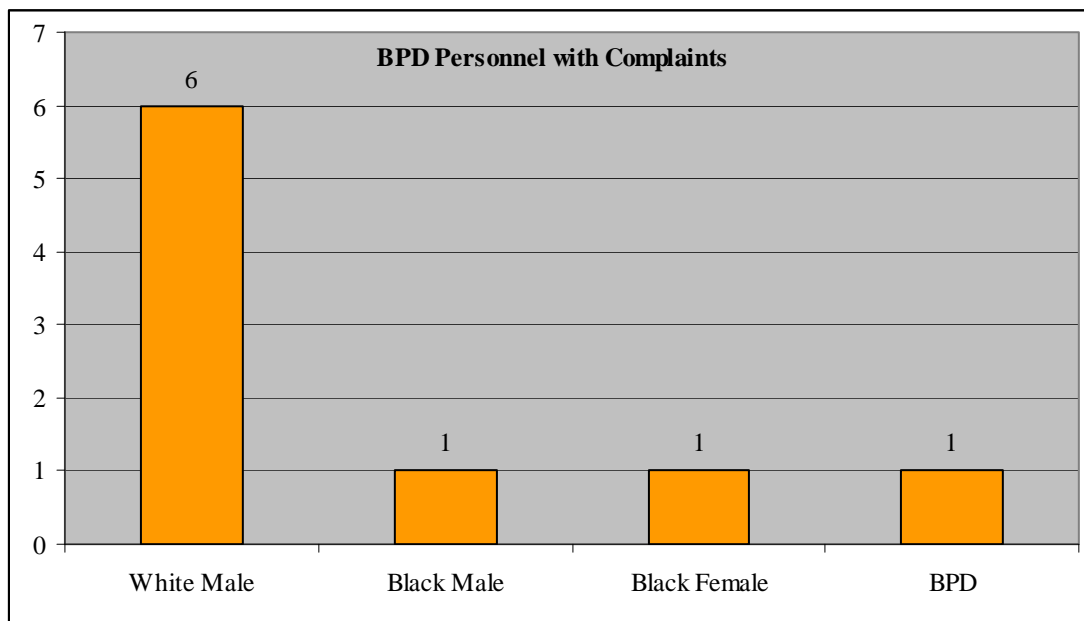

Citizen Complaints

During the first half of 2007, there were 9 citizen complaints filed with the Brookline Police Department's Office of Professional Responsibility, up from 8 during the same period last year. Of the complaints, 67% were lodged against white male officers (6), 11% were lodged against a black male officer (1), 11% were lodged against a black female officer (1) and 11% were lodged against the Brookline Police Department. Two of the complaints were for discourtesy, three for procedures or rules/regulations, two were for racial profiling, one for discourtesy and conduct unbecoming and one for discourtesy and racial discrimination. Of the complainants three were white males, two were black females, two were black males and one was a white female. One complaint was initiated by the Brookline Police Department.
