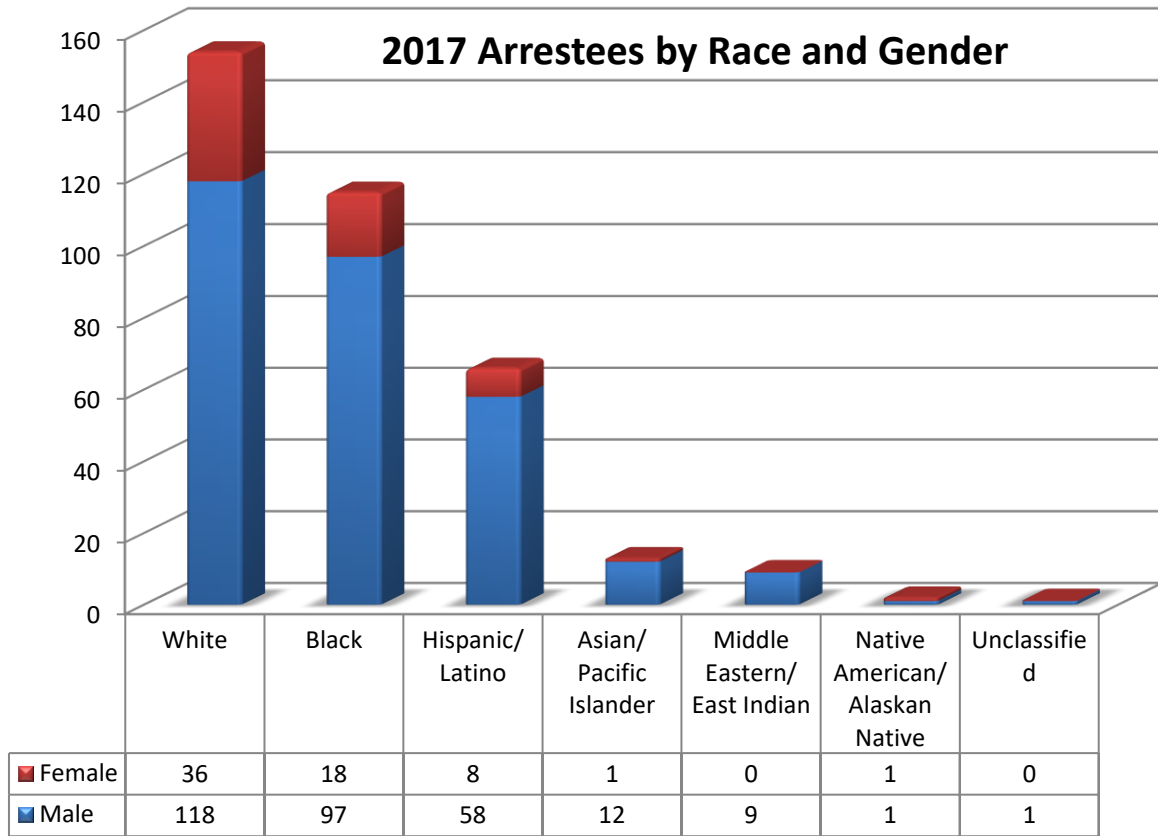

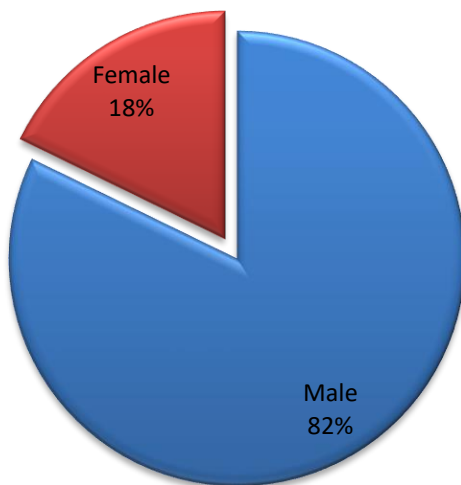
2017 YEAR END RACIAL/GENDER BREAKDOWN OF POLICE/COMMUNITY INTERACTIONS

ARRESTS:



In 2017, there were 360 arrests, **down 20%** from the 448 made in 2016. In 2017, 42.8% of the people arrested were white, 31.9% were black, 18.3% were Hispanic, 3.6% were Asian/Pacific Islander, 2.5% were Middle Eastern/East Indian and 0.6% was Native American/Alaskan Native and 0.3% were of an unknown race. 82% of the arrestees were male and 18% were female. One of the arrestees was a juvenile, down from 13 juveniles arrested in 2016.

2017 Mid-Year Arrests By Gender



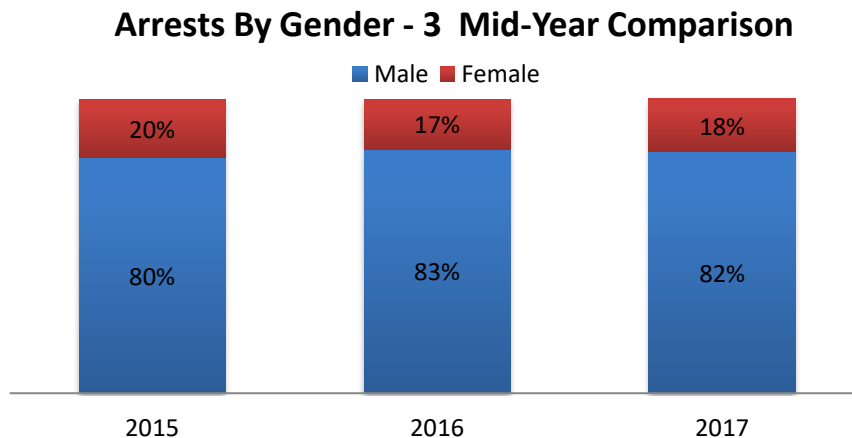
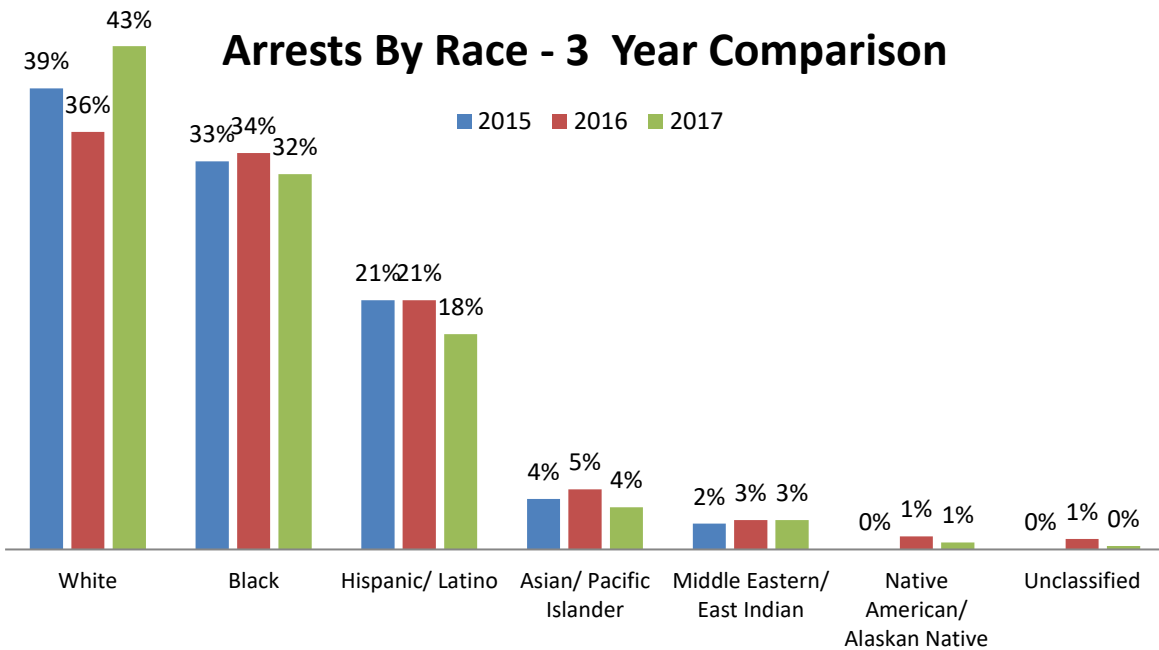

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In 2017, the BPD also placed 4 people into protective custody (for being under the influence of alcohol). 100% of these persons were white males. Additionally, there have been 3 sex offenders registered in our system this year. All three of them were white males.

By comparison in 2016, there were 448 arrests, down 29.4% from the 635 made in 2015. 35.5% of the people arrested were white, 33.7% were black, 21.2% were Hispanic, 5% were Asian/Pacific Islander, 2.5% were Middle Eastern/East Indian and less than 1% were Native American/Alaskan Native or an unknown race. 83% of the arrestees were male and 17% were female. 13 of the arrestees were juveniles, down from 19 in 2015.

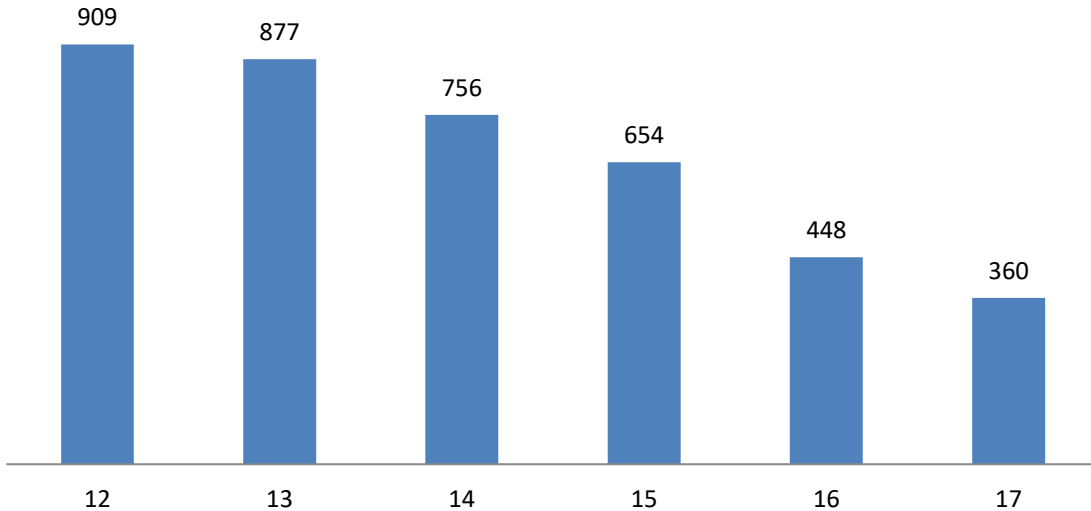
The following two graphs compare the percent breakdown by race and gender of persons arrested over a three year period.

Below is a graph detailing the amount of arrests that have occurred in the past 6 years (2012-2017). Similarly to crimes, arrests are at an all-time low. Since 2012, arrests have been down 60%. This decrease in arrests corresponds with the decrease in crimes that has been occurring in Brookline in the past few years and the Department’s move toward procedural justice, crisis intervention and diversionary referral.

Total Arrests by Year



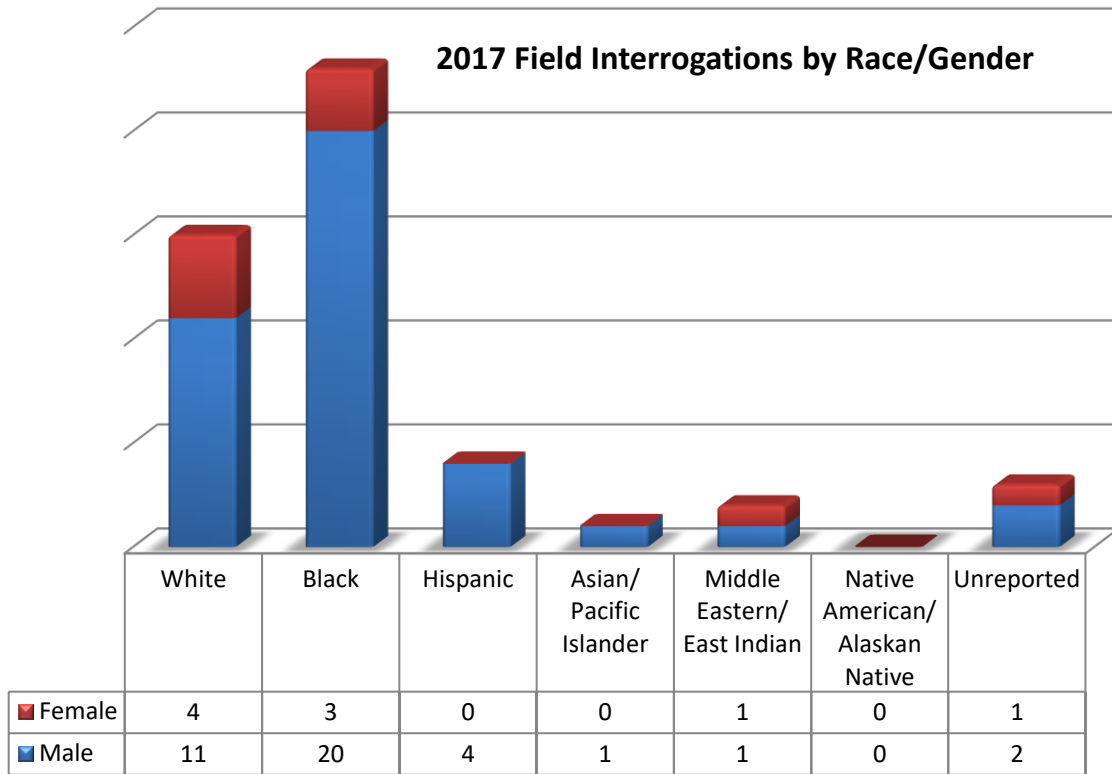
FIELD INTERROGATIONS:

Commencing with the beginning of 2015, the Department began to breakdown what we had previously classified as Field Interviews into two subsets: Field Contacts & Field Interrogations. Field Contacts cover those individuals who the police encounter during the normal course of conducting routine police services that we need to identify. Field Interrogations (FIs) are individuals stopped by the police whom the police or citizens believe to be acting suspiciously and rise to the level of suspicion that they have, are or are about to commit a criminal offense.

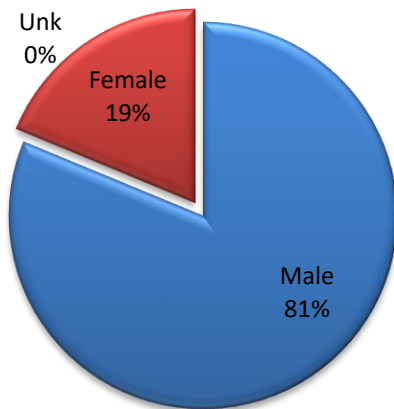

2017 Field Interrogations by Gender

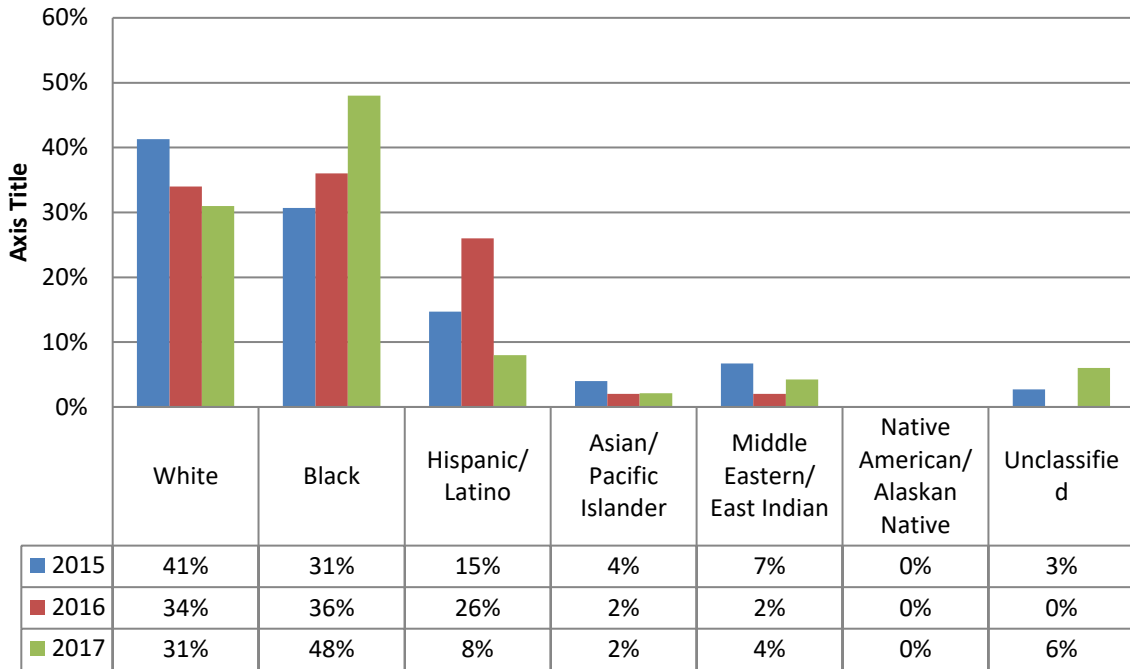


In 2017, there were a total of 48 field interrogations conducted. Of these people who were stopped and questioned for suspicious activity, 31% were white, 48% were black, 8% were Hispanic, 2% were Asian/Pacific Islander, 4% were Middle Eastern/East Indian and none were Native American/Alaskan Native. Three were not identified by race. 81% of the people FId were male and 19% were female.

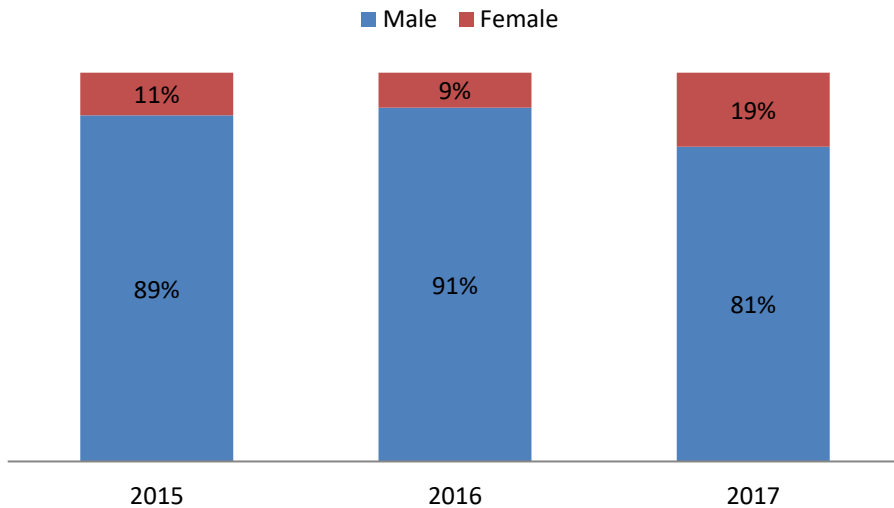
The following two graphs compare the percent breakdown by race and gender of persons FId for the past 3 years when the definition of FIs changed.

FIs By Gender - 3 Year Comparison

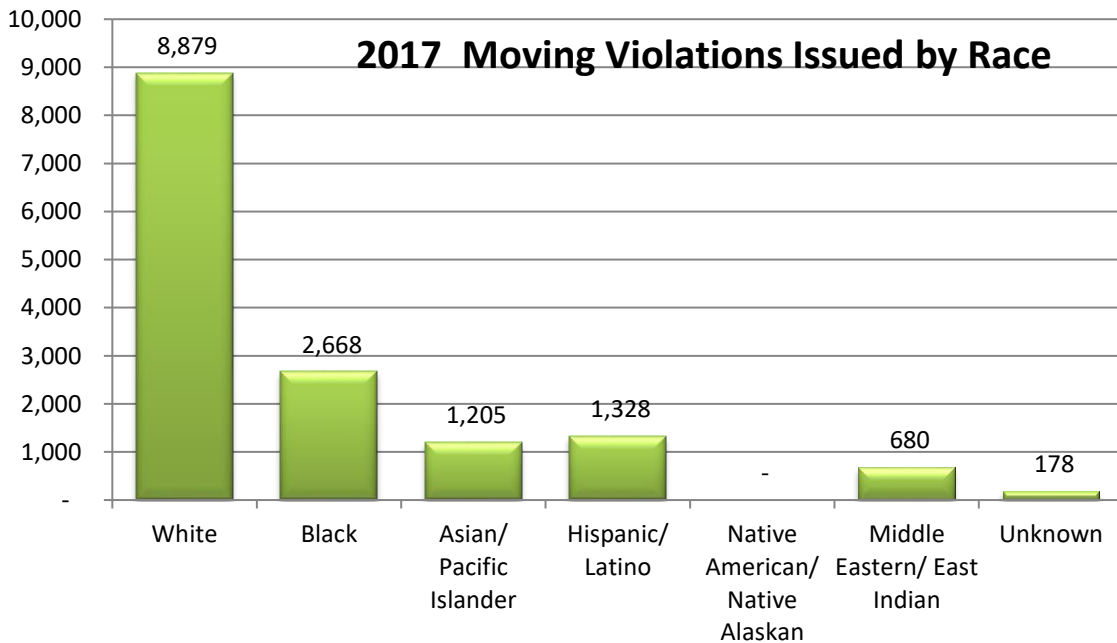


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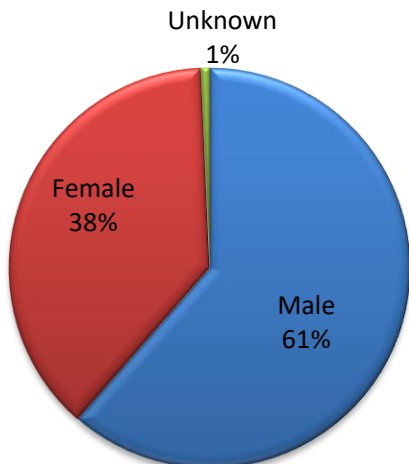
MOVING VIOLATIONS:

In 2017, there were moving violations 14,938 issued, down 8% from the 16,298 issued in 2016. Of the motorists issued citations in 2016, 59.4% were white, 17.8% were black, 8% were Asian/Pacific Islander, 8.8% were Hispanic, 4.5% were Middle Eastern/East Indian and none were Native American/Alaskan Native. 1.1% were not classified by a race category. Of these citations, 61% were issued to male motorists and 38% were issued to female motorists. In 2017, there were no non-inventory motor vehicle searches conducted.

2017 Moving Violations by Gender



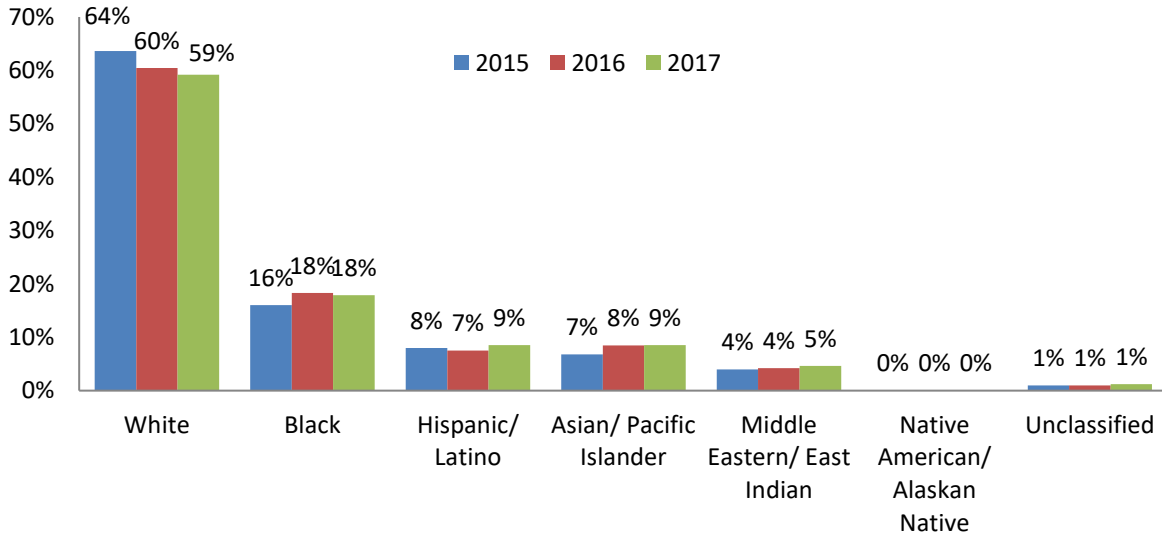
By comparison in 2016, there were 16,298 moving violations issued. Of the motorists issued citations, 60.5% were white, 18% were black, 7.5% were Asian/Pacific Islander, 8.5% were Hispanic, 4% were Middle Eastern/East Indian, none were Native American/Alaskan Native and 1% was not classified by a race category. Of these citations, 60% were issued to male motorists and 39% were issued to female

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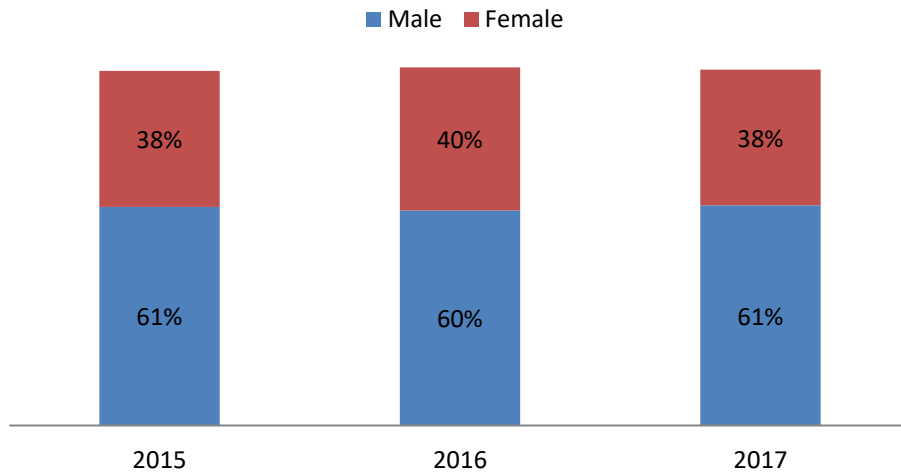
motorists. During the year, there were no non-inventory motor vehicle searches conducted.

CITIZEN COMPLAINTS:

During 2017, 2 citizens filed complaints with the BPD's Office of Professional Responsibility for alleged misconduct that resulted in two violations investigated against two sworn officers. The complaints were for discourtesy/rudeness and general misconduct. One was mediated and one was unfounded based on an audio/video recording of the incident.

The Department's volume of documented community interactions (from 71K calls for service, 15K moving violations, 117K parking tickets, 47 field interrogations and 360 arrests) reaches more than 200K (which does not account for the thousands of daily informal interactions during traffic posts, walking beats, community presentations and routine patrol), resulting in a 0.00002% rate of complaints (or 1 in every 100K documented interactions).

Of the 2 complainants, one was a white male and one was a black male. Both officers were white males. The relationship between complainant/officer, nature of the complaint and the finding is below:

As in years past, the Department continues to utilize the Early Intervention Program (EIP), when appropriate, with employees who receive citizen complaints. The EIP provides for increased supervision and training.
